Welcome Address

Dear Esteemed Guests, It is my greatest honour and privilege to welcome all of you to this year's edition of the West Africa Media Excellence Conference and Awards (WAMECA 2020). This is the fourth edition of this great annual convening of media professionals and actors across Africa.

For the first time since the maiden event in 2017, we don't have all speakers and participants seated in one room. We have had to host our guests both physically and virtually.

The reason for the changes made to this year's event is not farfetched. We meet at a time of an ongoing unprecedented global crisis. A crisis of a catastrophic COVID-19 pandemic that has killed almost 1.5 million people, devastated economies, disrupted education systems and left the world in a state of uncertainty.

Your enthusiastic response to our invitation, especially for those of you who have had to travel from your different countries to be with us despite the significant challenges with travel is heartwarming. Your presence is a testimony of your commitment to

advancing media development and excellence in West Africa in particular and Africa as a whole. We are sincerely grateful to you for honouring our invitation.

Indeed, over the last eleven months, the COVID-19 pandemic has caused us so much loss and anguish. But it has also taught us some significant lessons. Undoubtedly, one of such lessons has been the realisation of the incredible role and value of the media to society in times of crisis.

Fighting the pandemic has required that people are made aware of the disease, educated about safety protocols and measures, sensitised about measures being adopted by authorities and countering misinformation of all types about the pandemic. With these imperatives, it quickly became clear to everyone, including even brutal dictators and media repressors, that no other institution or group of workers could deliver these multifaceted requirements for combating the pandemic better than the media and journalists.

The media did not and have not failed to deliver. At the risks of infection, journalists continue to work from the streets to newsrooms and studios to bring true and accurate information about the pandemic to the people. During lockdowns, journalists were on the streets with security personnel, not with guns, but with just their pens, notepads and cameras, to help keep the people informed and educated about the pandemic.

Even in the face of repression, attacks and harassment, journalists remained on the frontlines to serve the people with critical information.

Journalists played and continue to play the crucial roles of combating the pandemic not because they are immune to the pandemic. Indeed, several journalists got infected and many have died. Journalists remained on the frontlines because they had to remain loyal to their calling and committed to serving public interest.

Unfortunately, the media have not been spared the dire ravages of the pandemic. The impact of the pandemic has, in fact, only worsened an already fragile and precarious media ecosystem in Africa. Already, the media in Africa have been suffocating under various repressive laws, rampantattacks, harassment and intimidation by both state and non-state actors. Sadly, many of these crimes that are committed against journalists go unpunished thus, perpetuating a culture of impunity for crimes against journalists.

In Africa, the media depend almost entirely on advertising and sales revenue for survival. The catastrophic impact of the pandemic on economies and businesses, and the consequent slump in media advertising and sales could only be a death sentence for the media. Indeed, since the outbreak of the pandemic, thousands of journalists have lost their jobs. Hundreds of media organisations have had to shut down; and many of those that are still operating are struggling to survive.

The current situation accentuates the need for immediate steps to be taken to save the media in Africa. Taking such steps requires meaningful brainstorming, synthesis of ideas and careful planning.

This is why this year's annual conference is focusing on the theme: The Future of Journalism in Africa. How do we get out from the impact of the pandemic? What next for the African media after the pandemic? What should be the business model for the media in Africa going forward? We all talk digitization. But how do we ensure we are not only digitizing but also monetizing for the survival of the media? How do we deal with the challenges of misinformation and disinformation?

Together with media experts and actors in the region, we will seek to find answers to these and many more questions that are central to the viability of the media industry in Africa. But even as the threats to independent journalism continue to rise, we are fully aware that there are journalists not deterred and committed to contributing positively to development through excellent journalism. Such journalists need to be recognised for their excellence, praised for their courage, and honoured for their commitment. And this is what the awards component of WAMECA does - to honour the journalistic stars of West Africa. It is our hope that the WAMECA awards will continue to motivate winners to do more and inspire others to want to do even better.



Mr. Abdourahamane Diallo's early career with UNESCO spanned working at the Headquarters in Paris as a member of the permanent delegation of Niger, and then as a consultant in the UNESCO secretariat, before becoming a staff member in 2002 as programme specialist in the Africa department, responsible for monitoring cooperation with the African Union and the

He arrived in his latest position as Head of Office in Accra and UNESCO Representative to Ghana in December 2018.

Currently, Reyhana Masters is the Sub Saharan Africa regional editor of the International Freedom of Expression Exchange (IFEX) and also serves as the chairperson for the Information for Development Trust—an investigative journalism media hubsheco-founded.

He is recognised as a social innovator in the field of "News and Knowledge" by the Ashoka and Knight Foundations. He is a board member at Cenozo and at Africa Check.









