



MONITORING OF INDECENT CAMPAIGN LANGUAGE ON RADIO

FINDINGS FOR THE PERIOD MAY 1-15, 2016.

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1.0 Introduction

As Ghana's 2016 elections draw closer, public discourse in the media, especially, radio continues to be dominated by, the use of insult and indecent expressions which have the potential of inciting violence if not checked. To help address the worrying phenomenon of insult and indecent expressions in political in campaign discourse on radio, the Media Foundation for West Africa's (MFWA), under its *Promoting Issues-based and Decent Language Campaigning for a Peaceful, Free and Fair Elections in Ghana in 2016* project, is monitoring and reporting the use of hate speech and other indecent expressions on 60 selected radio stations across the country. The project which is being implemented with funding support from OSIWA, STAR-Ghana and the EU (through Socioserve Ghana), is aimed at naming and shaming perpetrators of hate speech and indecent expressions.

The project involves the daily monitoring of expressions used by mainly politicians and activists on the selected radio programmes using a publicly validated monitoring instrument. It also monitors how presenters on the target radio stations handle their programmes to ensure that indecent expressions are not tolerated on their programmes. Each target station is assigned to a trained monitor who is also equipped with a digital recorder to record the programmes monitored.

Using the monitoring instrument, the monitors send daily reports to the MFWA. The reports are analysed by a team of programme staff and researchers at the MFWA with a consolidated report publicised every two weeks. It is hoped that the bi-weekly reports will help the electorate to make informed voting decisions. The reports are also meant to provide credible evidence for the appropriate institutions and groups to take informed remedial actions.

2.0 Findings

This report presents findings of the day-to-day monitoring of indecent expressions captured on 40 out of the 60 target radio stations. Monitoring of the remaining stations will start in June and July 2016. Specifically, the findings cover monitoring undertaken over the period, May 1-15, 2016. The report highlights the categories of indecent expressions which were used over the monitoring period. It also names political candidates or activists who used indecent expressions, the specific expressions used, and the radio stations and programmes on which those expressions were made.

2.1 General Findings

A total of 923 programmes were monitored on the 40 radio stations over the two-week monitoring period. The programmes monitored included news bulletins, current affairs and political discussion shows. The main subject matter that dominated the news and programmes monitored was the Limited Registration Exercise. It was also the discussion of the same issue that many indecent expressions were recorded.

Majority of the programmes monitored were handled by male hosts or presenters. The same was the situation with those who featured (discussants, interviewees, and callers) on the programmes monitored (close to 97 percent of them were males). No gender-specific insult was however recorded.

2.2 Categories of Indecent Expressions Recorded

Altogether, 69 incidents of indecent expressions were recorded. The 69 expressions were made up of Seven (7) categories of indecent expressions: unsubstantiated allegations; insulting and offensive comments; remarks endorsing violence; and provocative remarks. The others were remarks inciting or calling for violence; expressions promoting divisiveness; and a tribal slur. As shown in Table 1 below, unsubstantiated allegations maligning some individuals, groups, and political parties was the most commonly used indecent expression followed by insulting and offensive comments.

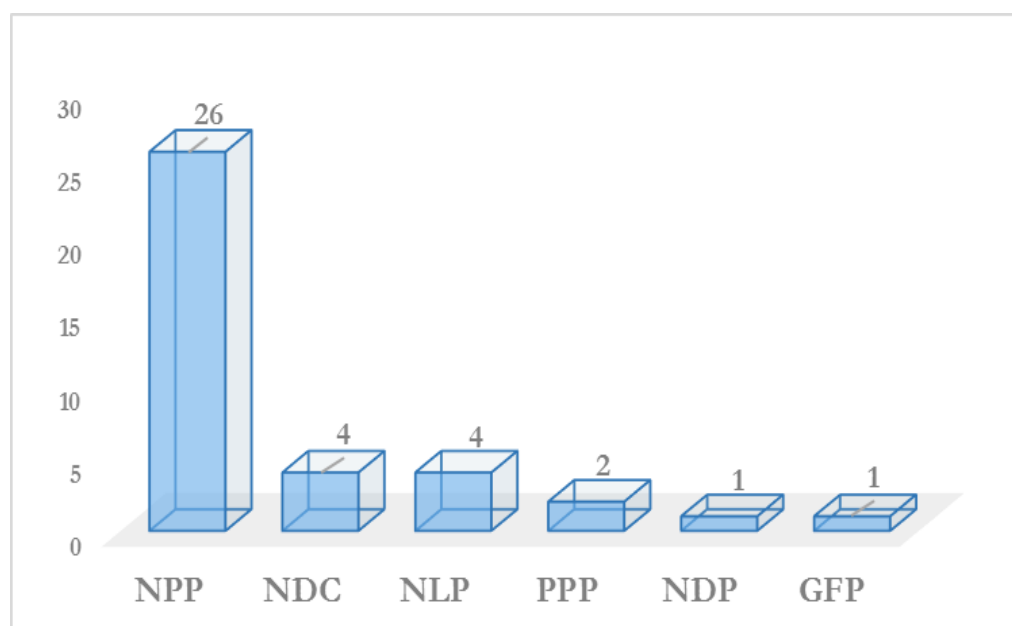

2.3 Political Party/ Group Affiliation of Individuals Who Used Indecent Expressions

Altogether, 39 individuals were captured making indecent remarks on the programmes monitored. These individuals participated in the programmes monitored as hosts, discussants, interviewees and callers. Out of the 39, 16 were individuals whose political affiliation was not established on the programmes they featured on. The remaining 23 were identified on the programmes as representing six political parties: New Patriotic Party (NPP); ruling National Democratic Congress (NDC), the unregistered New Labour Party (NLP), Progressive People's Party, National Democratic Party (NDP) and Ghana Freedom Party (GFP). The 23 political affiliates together made 38 (55%) of the 69 indecent expressions recorded over the monitoring period. Figure 1 below presents more details on this finding:

Categories of Indecent Expressions Used by Political Party Affiliates

Officials, supporters and affiliates of the NPP recorded the highest number (30) of indecent expressions – more than twice the total number of indecent expressions recorded by the other five (5) parties put together. They were the major culprits in the use of unsubstantiated allegations and remarks endorsing violence. Also, all the three (3) expressions promoting divisiveness were made by affiliates of the NPP. On the other hand, the only tribal slur recorded was made by an affiliate of the NDC. In Table 2 below, the categories of indecent expressions made by affiliates of the six political parties are presented. Also presented in Table 2 is the breakdown of the categories of indecent expressions used by individuals whose political affiliation was not established on the programmes monitored.

2.4 Specific Expressions Used

Below are the names of the individuals who made the 69 indecent expressions. The names are placed under the specific categories of indecent expressions they made. The radio stations on which they used those expressions and the dates on which the expressions were made have also been indicated.

Unsubstantiated Allegations

As a policy, the MFWA does not publish the indecent expressions people make since it amounts to rebroadcasting those remarks. The specific expressions made by people cited in our reports are, however, available at the MFWA for verification by those cited.

2.5 Radio Stations and Incidence of Indecent Expressions

Out of the 40 radio stations monitored, 16 recorded indecent expressions. Accra-based Montie FM recorded the highest number (16) of indecent expressions mainly on its Pampaso programme. Happy FM, also based in Accra, followed with 13 indecent expressions which were mostly recorded on its Democracy programme. Oman FM in Accra and Kumasi-based Ashh FM followed with 12 and 10 indecent expressions respectively. Details of the other stations and the number of indecent expressions recorded on them are presented in Table 3 below:

As noted in the first report, a significant number of the indecent expressions recorded over May 1-15, 2016 were made by hosts and presenters. Out of the 31 indecent expressions attributed to individuals whose political affiliation could not be established on the programmes monitored, more than half (17) were made by programme hosts and other journalists.

For instance, out of the 10 indecent expressions recorded on Kumasi-based Ashh FM, Daasebre Dwamena, a co-host who supports the main host in newspaper review during the station's morning discussion programme, National Agenda, singlehandedly made eight (8). Kwame Alfred of Oxy FM who featured on Happy FM's Democracy programme over the monitoring period

also registered almost a quarter (4) of the 13 indecent expressions recorded on Happy FM. The host of Montie FM's Pampaso programme, Mugabe Massie, also made three (3) of the 16 indecent expressions recorded on the station.

It is worth noting that during the monitoring period, some hosts/presenters made a conscious effort to demand from some of the individuals named above to retract, withdraw or apologise for indecent expressions made. Even though not all of them succeeded, the effort is very commendable.

3.0 Conclusion and Recommendations

Findings as presented above from the two-week monitoring period (May 1-5, 2016), show a prevalence of unsubstantiated allegations in political communications on the selected radio stations monitored across the country. This is worrying as it impugns the reputations of individuals, groups and political parties. Another issue of concern is the situation whereby hosts and presenters are themselves the perpetrators of abusive language on the airwaves.

In consideration of these findings, the MFWA calls on radio hosts and presenters in the country to fully assume their gate-keeping role as moderators and encourage those who feature on their programmes to be savoury in their language. We also urge them to desist from the use of indecent expressions so they can be good examples to those who appear on their programmes.

We also call on all political parties, especially the NPP, to continuously engage and train their communicators to focus on issues-based discussions and desist from personality attacks.
